



## **Rules & Regulations - Rural Ambassador Award**

- Open to ambassadors aged between 20 and 30 years as of the 1<sup>st</sup> May 2025 and the finalist must reside in Victoria.
- Each Show can run a Rural Ambassador Show qualifier and the winner at Show Level then represents the Show at the Group Final.
- An ambassador having won at their local Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show or represent another group.
- A maximum of 12 finalists will be eligible for the State Final with preference to all Group Final
  winners and each runner up of each group will be considered. If numbers exceed 12 finalist's
  interviews will be held at the information day to determine the remaining State Finalists.
- The State Final is held at the Melbourne Royal Show and each finalist is judged based on the criteria below.
- Each Finalist will need to supply a resume with a cover letter and a draft/copy of speech for the State Final, which will be given to the judges of the State Final.
- Each Finalist will be interviewed by a panel of three judges and the State Finalist will need to present a speech at the presentation function. The winner will be announced at the presentation function.

## **Judging Criteria**

- Local Show Involvement (25 Points) Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Show Society.
- Community Involvement (20 Points) Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and
  a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Community.
- General and Rural Knowledge (20 Points) Entrants must demonstrate a broad general knowledge and an awareness of Local/National Community issues. Entrant must also have an understanding of current affairs relating to rural life and industry.
- Personality & Communication Skills (20 Points) Personality Traits consistent with both the
  awards and the entrant's ambitions and goals will be assessed (e.g. enthusiasm, creativity,
  confidence, leadership). Also, entrants are expected to demonstrate effective communication
  skills written, oral and interpersonal.
- Ambitions, Goals & Interests (15 Points) Each Entrants ambitions and goals will be assessed
  on their integrity and relevance to the award. Entrants must demonstrate steps towards
  achieving their goal.
- Style, Grooming & Presentation (10 Points) Entrants presentation will be assessed according
  to the suitability of their attire and conduct in a range of contexts.
- **Conduct (10 Points)** How the entrant behaves and demonstrates appropriate behaviour in each setting eg. being polite, well dressed and soft spoken.
- Public Presentation (3-minute speech) (20 Points) Entrants public presentation will be assessed according to the quality of the content, delivery and the extent to which it addresses the set topic.

- Runner Up: \$1500.00 Prizemoney



# **Junior Show Ambassador Award**

- Open to ambassadors aged between 16 and 19 years on the day of their Local Show.
- Each Show can run a Junior Show Ambassador Show qualifier and the winner at Show Level then represents the Show at the Group Final.
- An ambassador having won at their Local Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show or represent another group.
- The winner of the Group Final then represents the Group at the State Final, which is held at the annual VAS Convention.
- Each Finalist will be judged based on the criteria below.
- At the State Final the Finalists will need to provide a cover letter and resume that will be given to the judges.
- Each Finalist will be interviewed by a panel of three judges and the winner will be announced at the Convention Dinner.

## **Judging Criteria**

- Local Show Involvement (15 Points) Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Show Society.
- Community Involvement (10 Points) Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Community.
- General and Rural Knowledge (15 Points) Entrants must demonstrate a broad general knowledge and an awareness of Local/National Community issues. Entrant must also have an understanding of current affairs relating to rural life and industry.
- **Personality and Confidence (10 Points)** Personality Traits consistent with both the awards and the entrant's ambitions and goals will be assessed (e.g. enthusiasm, creativity, confidence, leadership).
- Ambitions/Goals (20 Points) Each Entrant's ambitions and goals will be assessed on their
  integrity and relevance to the awards. Entrants must demonstrate steps towards achieving
  their goal.
- Communication Skills (20 Points) Entrants are expected to demonstrate effective communication skills – written, oral and interpersonal.
- **Presentation and Grooming (10 Points)** Entrant's presentation will be assessed according to the suitability of their attire and conduct in a range of contexts.


VAS Ltd wants to showcase the Emerging Leaders of the State and these programs aim to allow young people to represent their Show Society/Community. The programs allow participants to develop their personal skills through interview experience, on-stage presentation, meeting new people with similar interests and developing interpersonal skills.

#### **Hot Tips for Organisers**

- VAS suggests that there is a coordinator for the award at your local Show that can help promote and encourage participants to enter.
- At a local Show an interview process can be undertaken and judged to the criteria.
- Previous Ambassadors from your local Show can make great ambassador judges or mentors.
- Show Societies may need to ask or approach a younger person involved in their Show Society to represent them and get involved in the competition.
- The VAS Members Area has scoresheets for each competition available for you to access.

#### Questions that could be asked in Interviews or On-Stage Interviews

- What involvement do you have in your local Community/local Show?
- Identify any major setbacks that you believe are impacting the running of Agricultural Shows at present and long term. How would you address them?
- What are the three main products produced around your local area?
- How do you think you can involve the younger generation in getting involved in the community or local Show?
- What are your goals and ambitions in the next 10 years?
- Why did you get involved in this competition?

All competitors must pay gate entry to the Yarrawonga Show.

#### Smash up Derby rules and regulations

- 1. All drivers must hold a driver's license
- 2. All cars can be front or rear wheel drive
- 3. No panel vans, 4wheel drive or full chassis vehicles are permitted
- 4. All vehicles must retain their original height
- 5. No passengers will be permitted
- 6. No internal or external bar work will be permitted except as stated
- 7. A steel bar must be fitted between the B pillars to act as a brace for the back of the driver's seat
- 8. A 3mm steel plate bolted or welded to the outside of the driver's side A and B pillar but inside the doorline is mandatory. It must finish at the window line. A bar fitted from the floor to the roof behind the driver is optional
- 9. All glass and plastic must be removed from the vehicle including the dash glass. A interior rear vision mirror is optional
- 10. All doors must be strapped closed with strapping or welded using 1" x ¼" metal strapping or chained with 8mm chain and D shackles
- 11. All drivers must wear crash helmets, full cotton overalls and gloves
- 12. All drivers must wear a seat belt that is in good condition. The vehicle must not contain any rust in either of the seat belt mountings
- 13. A minimum amount of fuel is recommended
- 14. A 5 to 25 litre can with screw top lid may be fitted in the center rear of the vehicle
- 15. Un less the fuel tank is fitted in front of the rear axle it must be removed

- 250g currants
- 125g chopped mixed peel
- 90g chopped red glace cherries
- 90g chopped blanched almonds
- 1/3 cup sherry or brandy
- 250g plain flour
- 60g self-raising flour

- 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 250g butter
- 250g soft brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind
- 1/2 teaspoon almond essence
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 4 large eggs

#### Method

Cut the fruit & almonds into 3-4 pieces and mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices. Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, and then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared tin 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered time and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3½ - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

- ½ cup sherry
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 tablespoons marmalade
- 1 cup self-raising flour
- 1 cup plain flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

#### Method

Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil.

Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then remove from stove, add bicarbonate soda and allow to cool. Add the sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well.

Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place in a greased and lined **20cm round cake tin.** 

Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.5 hours or until cooked when tested.

- 2 ½ cups self-raising flour
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- ¼ tsp ground nutmeg
- 1 cup brown sugar (firmly packed)
- 1/3 cup chopped in ½ Sultanas
- 1 cup coarsely grated carrot

- 1 tbsp orange marmalade
- 1 cup canola oil
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- ¾ cup orange juice
- 1 cup reduced fat milk



#### Method

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 190C (moderately hot).
- 2. Line a 12-hole muffin pan with round paper muffin cases Classic white muffin cases size (35mm Height x 80mm Wide x 50mm Base).
- Sift dry ingredients into a large bowl, stir in sultanas and carrots. Then add the combined marmalade, oil, eggs, juice and milk. Mix until just combined.
- 4. Spoon mixture evenly into muffin paper cases in muffin pan.
- 5. Cook for 20 minutes. To test if muffins are cooked insert cake skewer, if it comes out clean the muffins are ready.
- 6. Stand muffins in pan for 5 minutes before removing to cool.






